On 8 March, we are launching the big ver.di healthcare survey. The **Quality of Care Survey** is asking staff in hospitals, psychiatric units, service areas and geriatric care how they judge their work situation and how the current conditions affect the quality of care.

The results will help ver.di demand improvements before the upcoming state and federal elections. We need your help in order to place the issues that are important to you on the political agenda.

It is not by chance that we are launching the survey on International Women's Day (8 March). After all, the great majority of care workers in our healthcare system are women – often underpaid and forced to work under tough conditions. We want to find out what this means to you and the quality of your work. The results will be used to confront candidates and political parties during the election campaign. We need to make sure they not only produce words but act.

Your Union Secretary will provide you with an Excel-tool you can use to survey up to 25 colleagues. This will allow you to analyse the results on the spot. The larger the number of colleagues taking part, the more pressure we can put on our demands.

The survey will run until International Nurses Day on 12 May.

We will analyse the results in the following weeks and publish them in time for the Conference of Health Ministers on 15 June. The political decision-makers at the federal and state level will have to deal with your concerns not only at the Conference but also before and after the federal election on 26 September.

We will measure political parties and their candidates by what they will do for sustainable healthcare, better working conditions and high-quality care. **Join in!**
